- "The Pupil Premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers."
- "The pupil Premium is paid to schools as they are best placed to assess what additional provision their pupils need."
- "Ofsted inspections report on how schools' use of the funding affects the attainment of their disadvantaged pupils. We also hold schools to account through performance tables, which include data on:
 - the attainment of the pupils who attract the funding
 - the progress made by these pupils
 - the gap in attainment between disadvantaged pupils and their peers

FUNDING ALLOCATION

At North Cerney C of E Primary Academy we strive to ensure that all children have the opportunity to achieve their full potential. We want to prepare them for modern Britain and equip them with the knowledge, skills and understanding for the world after primary school. The effective use of Pupil Premium funding supports us to be able to achieve these aims.

Funding 2015-2016 was been allocated to:

- Targeted intervention groups. TA support is provided for identified children in identified areas by providing focused teaching for small groups of children throughout the school. We work towards ensuring that all children make good progress in English and Maths. Our focus is to enable the children to reach at least national expectations for their year group. We monitor their progress across the terms to ensure that impact is being made.
- Lunch time provision for vulnerable children
We value and understand the importance of play to children and our employment of a lunch time play worker will make sure that all children including those who find playtime difficult are able to have an enjoyable fulfilling time. This will impact on the learning once back in the class and build positive relationships for them.
- Targeted support from external agencies for pupils whose needs might include the support of counselling services.
- Training and CPD to enable us to support all children and to close the gaps where they exist between groups and individuals.
- Curriculum enrichment
We believe that every child should be able to take advantage of our extra curricula activities and the visits and trips that we organise. The impact of these children's learning is significant and these play a vital role in enthusing and motivating children's learning. Pupil Premium funding can be used to ensure all pupils are able to take part in enrichment activities.
