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| <b>Journey</b>     | An act of travelling from one place to another.   |
| <b>Migration</b>   | Movement of people to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions.                |
| <b>Emigration</b>  | The act of leaving one's own country to settle permanently in another; moving abroad.                         |
| <b>Immigration</b> | The action of coming to live permanently in a foreign country.  |
| <b>Refugee</b>     | A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster. |
| <b>Migrant</b>     | A person who moves from one place to another, especially in order to find work or better living conditions.   |
| <b>Invader</b>     | A person or group that invades a country, region, or other place.   |

### Sticky Journeys to Remember

- Sir Walter Raleigh led many expeditions to America and introduced tobacco and the potato into England.
- RMS Titanic was a British passenger liner that sank in the North American Ocean in 1912.
- The Kindertransport was a British rescue mission which aimed to move Jewish children out of Nazi Germany and its territories during World War Two (1939 - 1945).
- The HMT Empire Windrush was a ship which travelled from the Caribbean to Britain in 1948. Caribbean people who moved to the UK were known as the Windrush Generation.
